



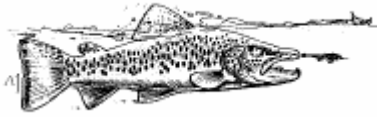

2006 OPTU Workdays

I am getting this out early this year as we have lots of work to do. Dates are subject to change but you can get an idea of what to expect. This year I would like to extend the workdays into 1 1/2 days; Saturday from 8am to about 2pm and Sunday 8am to noon. You don't have to participate each day, remember it's voluntary and we still want to have some fun.

April 15, 16 Saturday and 1/2 Sunday

We will be working on placing temperature units for Gila trout in the Blue watershed. We will work on the lower parts of the watershed, weather permitting. Last year we got 4 units in this area late in the season. I'd like to get these in early this year to get readings throughout the summer. We will also have a new camping area for this workday; to be determined.

May 6, 7 Saturday and 1/2 Sunday

We will be working on placing more temperature units for Gila Trout. This time we will be working in the upper tributaries of the Blue watershed. Hopefully we can complete the installation of these units on this and the April workdays. We will be camping in a new area, to be determined.

June 10, 11 Saturday and 1/2 Sunday

Hopefully our EAS Grant will pass for this one. We want to purchase 1000 Arizona Willows to plant along the banks of the WF of Black near the Thompson Ranch. I might stay another day to hike into Hayground creek and place some temperature units. This is the only watershed we do not even have one temperature unit in; it was also stocked with wild Apache Trout late last season. Camping at the site on FR113.

July 8, 9 Saturday and 1/2 Sunday

We will be gathering data from temperature units already in place and possibly placing new ones. The hikes will include Stinky Creek, WF of Black, Thompson and Burro. We will camp at the FR113 site.

July 29, 30 Saturday and 1/2 Sunday

We will be gathering data from Temperature unit already in field and placing some new ones. The hikes will include EF of Little Colorado, WF of little Colorado and SF of Little Colorado. We will camp at FR113.

August 19, 20 Saturday and 1/2 Sunday

We will hopefully gather any remaining temperature units already in place and finish placing any new ones. hikes into Home Creek and possibly Bear Wallow and Fish Creek. We will be camping on the lower WF of Black at this time. I will have maps indicating where to go. This is below the WF of Black Campground near Home Creek.

September 16, 17 Saturday and 1/2 Sunday

This will be barrier repair time. I know that Stinky Creek Barrier is still leaking and we will repair any other Barriers noticed in need of repair during the season. I would also like to electroshock between the barriers on the WF of Black. Last season we noticed some browns cruising above the lower barrier. If the AZG&F can't get time on this perhaps the UA Student Chapter can do it as they have an electroshocker. We will discuss this possibility with AZG&F sometime soon as this issue definitely needs to be addressed. Camping at FR113.

October 7 Saturday

To be determined; finish up some last minute needs. Perhaps read some Temperature units in the Lower Blue area.

Date to be determined

There is a meeting on December 2 in Pinetop to set up some work of placing habitat structure in the WF and EF of the Black. I will try to work this into one of our workday weekend or create a new one. As you can see this is probably going to be one of our busiest workday seasons in a long time. Let's get active, I'm excited about this and hope you all are. Last year we had some great times at our workdays and accomplished plenty; I want to thank all that participated. My goal is to drop 20 pounds this winter so I will be prime for the hikes. I'm already off to a good start after my recent surgery has had me drop 8 pounds already!

Fishing Reports

Well I said I would try to tell about some of the spots I fish while out of town for work. This one is in New Mexico near a small town called Ramah. In fact the lake is called Ramah Lake. It has large Rainbows and a small population of smallmouth and largemouth bass all eager to hit your fly. The lake is shaped like an "L" and curves around a small mountain with a window rock on top that can only be seen at certain angles or with the right amount of liquor in you (just kidding). Remember I'm working! This lake sits at about 6,000 feet and fishes well in Spring, Fall and Mild Winters. It is located southeast of Gallup, about a 40 mile drive from there. Wading Difficulty Scale

Wouldn't it be great if before driving hundreds of miles to go fishing you could look up a simple number that explained the level of wading difficulty you could expect on the stream of your interest, or even on a particular stretch of it! You could adjust your destination to your age, goat-like daring and spryness, type of waders, whether to revise your will or not, etc. Well, I am suggesting here just that kind of a "Wading Difficulty Scale".

The idea came to me during OPTU retirees outing last October in Southern Colorado. At the time I was clinging to a large boulder as the high and nasty Piedra River was rushing by me, an inch or so below my waders. "What the hell is my 67 year old hide doing here?" I mused, my nails peeling the primordial granite, "To move or not to even stir that is the question!" It was pointless to shout for aid because the other five senior citizens were also somewhere in the canyon risking their lives and limbs.

Anyway, for the sake of our sport, I offer the following scale. In the left hand column you will find a number that expresses the level of wading difficulty. It roughly corresponds to the prospective flyfisher's age, say 40 for example. But you should give it a plus or minus of at least 5 years as some of us are treadmill-fit while others are master couch potatoes who, after the divorce, have trained their dog to get a beer. To the right there is a summary explanation of the degree of wading difficulty that applies to a given number on the scale.

20 Be able to rappel up and down sheer canyon walls to reach promising trout pools. Wet wading only, rain or shine, summer or winter

30 Be able to swim, rod clenched in teeth, to cross the river or otherwise to reach promising spots. Waders are usually left on shore.

40 Cleats are a must as some mossy boulder-to-boulder hopping in swift current is required.

50 Felt soled waders will be needed for intermittent wading over slick rocky ledges. Wading staff is recommended.

60 Wading over sand and gravel. Felt soles, wading staff, a change of dry clothes are a must. First aid kit recommended.

70 Slack water, sandy bottom. Felt soles, wading staff, several changes of warm dry clothes, a first aid kit, and life

jacked are required. Taking a cell phone and grandkid along recommended.

80 Beach-type fishing on a calm day. Wet wading in loose shorts. Absolutely no chest waders. Recommend wearing a lifeline tied to a tent peg driven into the shoreline.
